#### Cats Show Us the Way

In 2005, HAWS launched a special program called Project Guardian, designed to tackle the issue of cat overpopulation in Waukesha County though no-charge spay/neuter services for outdoor cats. This program required a commitment from many departments - SNIP. Animal Care, Animal Rescue, fosters, volunteers and



marketing. It was a total shelter effort, and the results were fantastic!

Success wasn't reached just through in-house cooperation: Over the years we have had a variety of funders keep this program viable. Donors, estate gifts, private and public foundations have all helped to keep Project Guardian at no cost to our community. In the past three years we have received over \$65,000 toward this cause! Thanks to a grant from the ASPCA, we've been able to add a program coordinator in recent years, putting a person out in the public to educate on the importance of spay/neuter and give hands-on assistance. Athletes for Animals and Petco Foundation have contributed towards covering the surgical costs for our trap/neuter/release felines.

HAWS' brand-new K9 Task Force is also a multi-faceted solution that encompasses all departments – and requires the help of our entire community. On the national level animals, particularly dogs, are entering shelters at an alarming rate. Postpandemic adoption numbers are flattening and, for some species, dropping. In particular, dogs are staying at shelters much longer before finding their new homes. Those dogs acquired in the past two years, while people hunkered down at home, have unfortunately gotten less exposure to their neighborhoods and to visitors. Behavior issues abound, and the dogs in our care need our support now more than ever.

As a team, we have pulled out all the stops at HAWS. We are recruiting additional volunteers, have expanded our network of foster homes, added field trips out of the shelter for our dogs - all to support the mental and physical well-being of the animals in our care.

Thank you all who are helping and getting involved! As with Project Guardian, we are in this for the long haul, until we tip the scales and get all of our animals into long term homes. We all know having your own family is the best! 🤹



#### Did You Know?

HAWS adopters receive FOUR FREE behavior consults for the life of your adopted pet! These consults can take place at HAWS, or even in your home for an additional trip/mileage fee.

Additional consults are available, and will be billed at \$30 an hour. Already used consults in the past for your pet? Adopters will still get 4 free consults from 7/1/22 to the end of that pet's life.

#### **Leading the Pack**

HAWS' Behavior Department was created in 2009, with the mission of assisting pets both inside and outside of our shelter's walls. Training classes and one-on-one consultations are available to anyone in our community, but our staff and volunteers are dedicated to working with the animals living at HAWS as well. Our Mod Squad was created in 2010 as the primary group tasked to use behavior modification as a means to increase adoptability and decrease euthanasia.

Over a decade later, the work of the Behavior Department team is more visible – and crucial – than ever! Enrichment baskets filled with peanut butter jars, long lasting chews and special toys hang outside of each kennel. Calming music fills the adoption wards. Collaboration with other departments increases the reach, to help them socialize, learn life skills and meet more potential homes.

Deb arrived at HAWS as a stray in August of 2021 and was quickly adopted. Sadly, that adoption didn't work out and she was returned in November. The resulting teamwork led to Deb becoming a staff and volunteer favorite! She enjoyed birthday parties led by the Education team, where she received tons of love. (Deb is known to nudge you a little bit if she doesn't think you've given her quite enough attention.) She excelled at our Monday Manners training class with volunteers. Full of love, her happy tail wasn't afraid to let the world know. Those additional five months at HAWS were well-spent and Deb found her new home!

Yukon's story is similar – he was surrendered, adopted and returned within a two-month span. To ensure a better match the second time around, he became active with the Mod Squad and they were able to learn so much more about his needs. Success! Staff and volunteers who worked closely with him were sad to see Yukon leave, but they are so happy for his future as a hiking buddy for his new dad and dog sibling.

The Behavior team leads the way because of their specialized training, but our new K9 Task Force means additional opportunities for volunteers individuals, families and groups - and more happy tails and happy endings!

We are so excited to see the continued growth of our Behavior Department's important work with the new K9 Task Force shelter-wide initiative.

#### At its heart, behind the official language,

the role of HAWS' new K9 Task Force is very simple: Give shelter dogs the best life possible while they wait for their forever homes. Give quality to the quantity, no matter how long – or short – a time they are in our care.

As an open admission and no-kill shelter, HAWS' mission is to support all pets for however long they need. Facility-wide interventions can strategically improve the lives of the pets in HAWS' care, specifically those residents who have a longer stay at the shelter.

It isn't a new concept, but it is innovative, bringing together the pieces we already have available and in place at HAWS, into one seamless unit.

A unit with many, many working pieces!

Our **Behavior team** does the most interactive work with each animal, providing basic training – both in organized classes and one-on-one. Outings to pet-friendly places in the community, and playdates at our Schallock Center for Animals in Delafield, reinforce what the dogs have learned.

Getting to know a dog as an individual can lead to seemingly little things like knowing when a dog really likes a specific toy. That toy is then brought along to the adoption viewing room as a comfort, or is given to them during down time to relieve stress. It stays with the same dog until they are adopted and is sent home with them. Ultimately a squeaky toy can be the key to setting them up for success!

As with every area of HAWS, our volunteers are an absolutely crucial component. On a daily basis, **Dog**Walkers and the Mod Squad are the eyes and ears, logging details of interactions and sharing observations that give incredible insight into the needs and habits of each animal while helping take the edge off.

The newly-formed **Enrichment Volunteer team** specializes in mental stimulation for the dogs – helping them with puzzle toys, treat hide and seek games, or even just sitting quietly for some TLC.

Volunteer foster homes can be life-changing for a dog, cat or small animal, giving them time outside of the sometimes-stressful environment of the shelter. In the past, foster homes were used largely to assist in the treatment of medical issues, when a pet required more attention during recovery from surgery or illness. We have embraced the concept of foster-to-adopt, giving all the members of the potential new family time to get to know each other that much better.

The value of the behavior foster is that rather than monitoring vital signs, behavior fosters work with and monitor that dog's progress on everything from reactivity to anxiety. Rest assured, the foster home has a safety net in the form of written instructions, as needed check-ins and even a foster hotline available at any time.

A medical condition can be the reason both for a pet arriving at HAWS and staying a bit longer. **HAWS' veterinary clinic team** is able to perform basic *and* life-saving procedures, in turn reducing the amount of travel to another location and making follow-up care that much easier.

The **community-at-large** plays an invaluable role in support of the K9 Task Force!

Our social media posts requesting supplies and donations not only help inside the shelter but also assist the short- and long-term foster homes working with us. When you share a post, that friend of a friend you happen to reach may be looking to adopt...and you are the one who made it happen!

When a business welcomes HAWS' Mobile Adoption team, they give shelter pets the social outlets they need while helping spread the word. When a corporate group reaches out for a project, HAWS has plenty for them to assist with.

Where to we go from here?

We are grateful to our start-up sponsors Best Friends Animal Society and the St. Croix Valley Foundation, who have put their faith and financial support into our long term canine residents.

Our next steps include improving the quality of life and decreasing stress for all shelter pets, focusing on cats with help from the Petfinder Foundation Cat Enrichment Grant. We'll be growing our Pet Comfort therapy sessions through a Walmart Foundation Local Community Grant. And the Pedigree Foundation has provided funding to defray medical costs on dogs who are otherwise overlooked on transports from high-euthanasia areas due to age and/or medical issues.

Ladybug is just one of the thousands of animals that look to HAWS for a new beginning. With the K9 Task Force and community support, many, many success stories are just ready and waiting to be written.





Goats Mike and Ike are doing well, leisurely mowing their portion of the Center grass. This summer they have been sharing space with a special new neeeeighbor, a pregnant mini-mare named Candy Corn (the foal had not yet arrived at press time). While Candy isn't ridable due to her size, she is a feature of our education programs and on-site birthday parties.

Horses Caesar and Levi are temporary residents that have been helping with summer camp, teaching kids about horses and how to ride. They have been a perfect fit and we have enjoyed their stay immensely. HAWS continues to foster Big Sur, the 19-yearold Dutch Warmblood from Amazing Grace Equine Sanctuary (AGES). This gentle giant has been showing kids how to care for horses that need extra support due to certain conditions.

Another resident, Cal, is owned and loved by HAWS' Equine & Animal Care Specialist, Makayla. He is an off-the-track Thoroughbred and the senior citizen of the group at approximately 32-years-old! Even though he recently needed dental surgery, Cal still loves to run around from time to time as well as enjoy snuggles and a good grooming session. He is our go-to horse when someone is nervous, because of his quiet demeanor.

The permanent residents of the Schallock Center and owned by HAWS are Ranger, Skittles and Monet. Ranger arrived with Cal in June, 2021 - the first two horses to return the SCA to a working horse farm. An American Quarter Horse, Ranger is quite the class clown and toddler of the group at 4-years-old.

Skittles is an 18-year-old Chincoteague pony, from the island of Chincoteague off the coast of Maryland and Virginia! He swam across the channel during the Pony Penning Days that are held each year to keep the wild herd at a healthy level. He is far from a wild, crazy pony...although he and Ranger can be seen goofing around in the pasture together.

This spring we adopted Monet, the 19-year-old Standardbred who came to HAWS from AGES along with Big Sur. We believe he'll make a great riding horse in the future; he is easy-going and enjoys visiting with guests from time to time.



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# **GET INVOLVED**

#### **Helping Hands & Paws**

HAWS volunteers play a crucial role in the success of the K9 Task Force, supporting the day-to-day workings of the initiative as well as providing special project assistance.

Volunteers that have gone through the Dog Walker 2.0 and/or Mod Squad training are doing the actual hands-on Task Force work with the resident dogs, both at the shelter and through field trips to the Schallock Center and other pet-friendly public places. These interactions don't just give the dogs exposure to a variety of people and socialization, but also provide for additional sets of eyes to observe and document behaviors for the Behavior Department staff.

Volunteer Coordinator Devon is looking to grow the ranks of the Mod Squad in particular. She notes, "Because of their specialized training and skills, this group will eventually be training other volunteers, and helping both humans and dogs!"

A new team of Enrichment Volunteers is also interacting with shelter residents; their specialty is mental stimulation rather than physical. The adage "a tired dog is a good dog" doesn't just mean a nice walk or a play date, but also staving off boredom with puzzle toys and stuffed, frozen Kongs. Devon notes that at this point this group consists primarily of dog walkers looking to add to their usual duties. But, anyone can join this group, and volunteers are welcome to be part of the enrichment team only if they so choose.

HAWS' in-house volunteers are not the only ones making an impact within the new Task Force! Groups of corporate volunteers have been doing projects on- and off-site, making snuffle mats and tug toys, and filling and freezing those aforementioned Kong toys by the hundreds. The Task Force initiative means animals are spending time both in the Waukesha shelter facility and out at the Delafield Schallock Center; we've found the need for supplies has increased - so collection drives to restock our treats and toys are more important than ever.
