

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To Live Humane

HAWS' mission is twofold - the sheltering and care of animals in need, and education of others to continue growing our humane community. It is simply said in our slogan: "Teach, Train and Live Humane." But what does it mean to "live humane"? Executive Director Lynn Olenik



and Maggie Tate-Techtmann, Director of Organizational Development, share their thoughts.

Lynn Olenik: To live humane means to treat all with kindness and respect, helping them live their best life, not just live. As humans, we need to be stewards of the gift that is our animal companions. I think using the word "humane" - derived from "human" - can actually be misleading, because animals are much better at being humane!

Maggie Tate-Techtmann: Living humanely means we recognize the power of our actions and care for animals in need. When an animal loves you, you're the luckiest person in the world. Pets are the greatest teachers. If you listen, you can learn so much.

LO: The concept of "Teach, Train and Live Humane" centers on teaching our youth in particular. The farther we go with technology, the further away we get from the soft skills we were previously taught in school. Loyalty, duty, respect, fair and equal treatment these are all things that do need to be taught, and that doesn't happen through

MTT: HAWS uses adoptions and education, and our unique position as an animal care and welfare organization, to tailor programs that strengthen the human-animal bond. We know a more compassionate community is possible - we reach more than 12,000 youth each year through our many programs, and we see the results of our efforts every day!

LO: The traits of compassion and empathy are truly exemplified by animals.

MTT: Your dog at home on the couch, your cat perched in a sunny window, your bunny busy with hay...their joy spending time with you...we can mirror them in our own actions.

LO: Training is also extremely important; we are responsible to bring out the best in our animals. It isn't enough to just welcome a pet into your home. They need to be taught to live in and be comfortable in our world. Too many animals come to HAWS that weren't taught the basics by their owners. And it is so enjoyable to be able to bring a pet to places with you, rather than having to leave them sequestered at home.

MTT: Living humanely means we put all animals in need at the top of our priority list every day. Nationally, shelters are experiencing disturbing rates of pets being surrendered, in high states of need. HAWS is not immune to this - we are experiencing pets coming to us with greater needs than ever before, and as a result they are waiting longer than ever to find their adoptive homes. We assist more than 10,000 pets each year, not just through animal rescue and spay/neuter but also with training programs, and community services like our pet pantry and safe keep - programs for both pets and their people.

LO: It truly comes down to this: if everyone would live humanely, it would be a much better world – for animals and people both!

HAWS Receives Green Bay Packers Foundation Grant

In December, HAWS received a grant from the Green Bay Packers Foundation to help fund field trips - "K9 OTAs" for our more energetic dogs at the shelter. These dogs need more exercise than just regular dog walks; the large areas at our Schallock Center allow dogs to truly run, swim, and play in groups. And, with added funding from the Friends of HAWS, the behavior team was able to purchase FitBark activity trackers to use before, during and after playgroups and field trips to better understand and increase their impact.

Reactive Rover & Confident Canine: Classes for the COVID Dog

Increased adoption rates during the pandemic ultimately led to dogs needing to overcome two main concerns stemming from social distancing - on-leash reactivity towards dogs, humans and cars, and a lack of confidence or anxiety around strangers. Offered at both our main Waukesha shelter and the Schallock Center, HAWS' Confident Canine class helps dogs and their family members overcome "stranger danger." A brand new class offered at the Schallock Center, Reactive Rover, allows dogs and their family members to start at a workable distance from their triggers. Both of these classes provide coping and management skills, a network of people and dogs on the same journey, and a light at the end of the tunnel! Positive Reinforcement

HAWS' K9 Task Force, created in Spring 2022, continues to grow and develop shelter-wide initiatives to improve the quality of life for the dogs in our care. The results have been very encouraging: on average, each month the K9 Task Force has helped more than forty long-term or harder-to-adopt dogs find their forever homes!

We know that longer shelter stays for dogs can lead to unwanted behaviors, which can then multiply and have negative consequences. HAWS' Behavior team uses 1:1 training, in-kennel enrichment, adoption counseling, fostering, veterinary evaluations to identify dogs that would benefit from anxiety medication, and facility improvements to keep our dogs healthy and happy.

Sophia N. is our official K9 Task Force Leader. A graduate of Carroll University, Sophia got to know HAWS through our partnership fostering program with CU Animal Behavior students. Her years of hands-on experience with dogs help in her role as the eyes and ears in the kennel, working directly with dogs that need support and creating behavior plans so volunteers can also get involved.

Another new initiative, a "sleepover" program, came about when Behavior Program Director Kendall S. and foster coordinator Jessica P. attended an online series highlighting the benefits of short-term fostering. Outings & Overnights started with a request to current volunteers: would you consider taking a long-term resident dog home for the night or weekend? That first weekend, three dogs participated, and everyone noticed a difference when the dogs returned after those few days of relaxation. Talk about positive reinforcement: Diamond and Mira were adopted just days after their

But the real success stories began a month later, when we took the program public. Cody came to HAWS in October after his owner unexpectedly passed away. He had been at HAWS for a month, battling some medical issues of his own, when a family signed up for our Thanksgiving Break Overnight. When we brought Cody out to meet them, it was pretty evident that he would not be returning to HAWS at the end of the weekend! It was love at first sight for all of them, as evidenced by the family picture, bottom left.

We learn so much more about our canine residents when they spend time out of the kennel, in a home or on a field trip. The personality traits and information shared with HAWS' staff after these outings, and the photos and stories shared on social media of a pup having fun, make a tremendous impact. Most importantly, providing respite for a dog that has spent weeks in the shelter has lasting effects, relieving stress and decreasing cortisol levels.




No one at HAWS will forget

the events of Tuesday, November 15, 2022. A routine transport flight from Louisiana, and the at-risk dogs on board, became international news when the plane made an emergency landing at Western Lakes Golf Club – several miles from the planned destination of Waukesha County's Crites Field. A week later, we all celebrated Thanksgiving with a new sense of gratitude: all the people and dogs on board were safe, and many of the pets were already adopted and living in their new forever homes.

The stories behind the story are what captivated us, though, illustrating so well what it means to live humane.

The employees at Western Lakes were having a quiet, snow-filled morning of maintenance chores, but they immediately jumped into action to get everyone out of the plane, improvising temporary housing for the dogs whose crates had broken, including tucking a puppy or two in a coat.





Transports are life-changing, not just for the animals given a second chance, but also for the people that team up to help. It is exhilarating. Just the most amazing feeling.

First responders and Lake Country Fire and Rescue personnel secured the scene to allow staff and volunteers from HAWS and our partner shelters to quickly transport the dogs to our shelter for triage – although some of the responders maybe didn't want to take the dogs out of their vehicles just yet!

And there were some light moments, such as when HAWS' Shelter Manager Kelly R. first got the call to "help animals in a plane that went down." She was waiting at the airport with the transport receiving team...and immediately knew this was our flight. Everyone jumped into the assembled vehicles to move the greeting party a few miles to the west – astonishing the first responders who remarked how quickly Kelly was able to mobilize a rescue team at such short notice. (She was tempted to bask in the praise, but admitted to the circumstances surrounding everyone's readiness.)











Knowing these dogs would need a little extra TLC, our young Tuesday Troops volunteers spent that evening in the kennels, reading to the newest residents and helping them settle. Extensive, worldwide (!) media coverage helped spur a tremendous level of monetary and supply donations, along with interest in HAWS in general. Notes of thanks for our work were posted on social media, and treats were delivered for the humans and dogs at the shelter – the Saz's catering crew based at Western Lakes even brought us an amazing lunch!

Within days, 16 of the 21 "Western Lakes Loves" that remained at HAWS were adopted, including Tinely and Hartlee (pictured, lower left). A number of the dogs found homes with the first responders and golf course staff – the first people they met after landing (sidebar).

Where do we go from here?

The future of our transport program remains secure. HAWS will continue to work with our national partners to receive these flights, along with ground transports, because there are still many, many at-risk dogs living in shelters outside of our area. Our local shelter partners have also committed to continuing this work with us, knowing we have homes here in southeastern Wisconsin that are ready to open their hearts to a pet that maybe needs a change of venue to find their forever home.

The investigation of the emergency landing continues, but at HAWS there is no question as to the level of caring and compassion in our community. This is what it means to live humane.

The Story of "MY" Marley

Tony called me on Tuesday: "Did you hear about the plane crash that happened at Westen Lakes golf course? There were 50+ dogs on the plane, coming from Louisiana, going to HAWS. There was this one I took off the plane that came running to me, then when she was moved to the mechanics' garage she was looking back and kept trying to come back to me. She was cute and had scratches on her nose."

So are you bringing her home?

NO, we already have 2 dogs, we don't need another one.

A bit later he called me back and informed me that he called HAWS to see where she was, if she was staying in Waukesha or going to a different shelter and when she was going to be available. He said if it's meant to be, it will be. Who knows which shelter she will end up at.

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog.

Then he informed me that he called his mom to see how she would feel about watching a third dog when we go on vacation.

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog.

Wednesday morning I found her online and sent him some pictures. He said we could go and see if she remembers him. I placed a call to HAWS to schedule an appointment to see her; they don't normally make appointments and couldn't hold her as she was just featured on TV and was sure to be adopted immediately...but they did, however, make an exception for Tony since he was part of the rescue.

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog.

We met at HAWS...and he already had the application filled out!

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog.

Marley came to the room we were in and ran to Tony, jumped right in his lap and started kissing him.

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog.

He started tearing up...and we ran home to get our other dogs, Minka and Maci, so they could meet.

Done deal! She came home with us, and immediately was up on the couch in his lap.

He got up an hour early for work today because he heard one little whimper from her. I came upstairs and they were cuddling on the couch.

But Marley is "MY" dog.

I think she was meant to be. She came from Louisiana, the destination of the first trip Tony and I took together.

But he said NO, we didn't need another dog. (Marley is "MY" dog!)

Pride was surrendered to HAWS in 2017. He was enjoying foster care at Central Bark when he met and played with my dogs Nick and Boots. He came to my house for a trial run, and I made him officially part of the family in October, 2017! He started agility training in November, 2017, and did his first agility trial in December, 2018. Pride now has agility titles in both AKC and CPE (Canine Performance Events)! In CPE, he has three Champion level titles and is working on the title for the next level up. He has achieved two different types of lure coursing titles in AKC: coursing ability and FAST-CAT (which is the 100-yard dash for dogs). We were invited to nationals in December; based on rankings of mph within the breed from the year before, Pride was the #2 Miniature Schnauzer in 2021 at about 24.5 mph! We took a long road trip to Orlando to compete in the 2022 AKC FAST-CAT Invitational, part of the AKC National Championships. Pride ran well and earned his next FCAT title and the big ribbon in the picture. Of note, there is an All-American (Mixed Breed) category for all of these sports,

so literally any dog can do them! Try it with your dog!

Expanding our Reach

HAWS is happy to announce a new education program in partnership with two fantastic local organizations that work with adults with intellectual disabilities, Journey 21 in Waukesha and The Haase House in Mukwonago. In this program, **Friends Helping Furends**, clients attend two sessions each month at HAWS, getting the opportunity to volunteer and help with animal care and socialization, while also gaining valuable life skills and time to be involved in their community.

HAWS provides School Field Trips at our Schallock Center, for K5–12 students and teachers in our community! These hands-on encounters focus on teaching kindness, empathy and compassion for all living things. Award-Winning Programs

Summer Camp with the HAWS Herd

Multiple week-long camps will be available at the Schallock Center this summer for ages 10-14, along with many two-day sessions for 7-9 year-olds.

Does your 10-14-year-old want to learn more about horses? Then sign them up for Horse Crazy Kids Camp! This one-week camp is beginner-friendly and teaches all about horses in a safe, fun manner. Topics include daily needs and welfare, but we'll also discuss different disciplines and teach basic horsemanship skills.

If your 7-9-year-old wants to learn more about horses, sign them up for **Junior Horse Crazy Kids Camp!** This is a two-day camp and a great way for younger kids to get a taste of what it's like to be around horses. Topics include grooming and tacking, plus there will be some riding opportunities! **Register at hawspets.org/camp.**



In the Pasture & the Stable

HAWS new Adult Horse Program is for any adult interested in learning more about horses – beginners welcome! Learn about safety and grooming, body language, basic care needs, nutrition, different disciplines, and even have some riding time (rider weight limit of 220 pounds for the safety of both horse and human). This 8-week program is \$275 per participant and meets for 1.5 hours each week; only two spots are available in each time slot to ensure one-on-one interaction!
