

I think all of us have witnessed the magic of animals, the transformation that occurs when a connection is made, the connection that transcends trauma, that heals, inspires and soothes one's soul. I believe more people have been saved by animals than perhaps animals saved by people, but it goes both ways.



I so often wonder how the animals that end up in a shelter cope with rejection and abandonment. What does this look like to them? From being in a quiet home or yard they find themselves in the middle of chaotic barking, odd smells - all alone. What does this feel like to them? It amazes me that more of these animals don't lash out...and I know full well that the human psyche would never cope if the roles were switched!

We, however, see the animals in our kennel, day after day jump up with enthusiasm to greet the next potential adopter with a smile; the next family coming through ignites the spark of hope again.

What of the animals that truly struggle?

Bless our team for taking the time to literally be lifesavers for all of the animals in our care. Volunteers and staff provide a vital lifeline until a new family can be found. Ask them, and they will tell you they get as much in return from the animal interaction as they give.

"Happiness is a Warm Puppy" is true! It is also true that there is comfort in sitting with a canine companion's head in your lap or a cat purring on your shoulder; watching kittens hop sideways across the room brings us joy and makes us laugh. Healing and support are a two-way street.

In-Shelter Programs: Participation Means Progress!

Roscoe was first adopted in 2022, but came back to HAWS in January of 2023. After a re-evaluation, our Behavior staff noted that he would do best in a home that can meet his physical and mental exercise needs, and continue his training routine.

Roscoe progressed from working solely with our Mod Squad to our general dog walking team. He does daily training, and even has gone on field trips to expand on his skills! Volunteers give feedback and note his various behaviors and reactions. The Adoption team then shares this information with any prospective new home

In June, Roscoe was able to spend a long weekend in one of our "Outings & Overnights" foster homes, where we also learned that he loved to get sprayed with the hose and play with toys. The foster home really enjoyed having such a great guest!

Working with our resident dogs helps them acquire much-needed skills. It also allows us - and our adopters - to make a more-informed decision on the right forever home. Our volunteers and dogs love the teamwork, and the time out of the shelter gives these pets more exposure to potential adopters. - Sophia N., K9 Task Force Manager

Reactive Rover Class: From Defensive to Curious

If you have a dog that shows reactive behavior while on a leash, it's hard not to feel embarrassed, frustrated, or even alone. Our Reactive Rover class builds a community of people that are going through the same journey. Everyone helps each other, and the joy I get to see watching that happen is why I love being an instructor.

Of course, I love seeing the outcomes, too! Bridgette's owner describes a phenomenon that she saw during her eight-week course: "I now see that Bridgette is curious of other dogs, rather than fearful or defensive." As a trainer, this is what I love to see: triggers becoming anticipatory rather than the alternative. That is a sign that they might be able to make friends with other dogs one day.

Another graduate, Jeter, and his owner are actually pursuing sports, which is something only of dreams for most reactive dog owners. Jeter was able to successfully attend a Treibball seminar with other dogs present, and is even excited to look into herding sports in the future. Jeter's mom says, "Reactive Rover helped teach skills and techniques for Jeter to become more neutral with dogs. We've seen a ton of progress and he consistently, successfully sees other dogs without any reaction." - Megan A., Behavior

The Value of Fosters: Dorothy's Story

Dorothy arrived at HAWS in mid-March via a rescue transport. Her foster-to-home story begins with her absolutely overwhelmed with shelter life, a scared, reactive mess. But, by going into a behavior foster home, she learned what it meant to be part of a family and became a beloved member of her new "pack"!

When Dorothy headed to her foster home on April 11, she was stressed and in decline. HAWS' foster caregiver Erin Z. had seen Dorothy's face and knew she could help; she was very happy to be chosen as the person who would guide Dorothy on her journey to develop positive skills.

Behavior Manager Megan A. tasked Erin to work with Dorothy on her reactivity to other dogs, settling down and relaxing, and utilizing enrichment instead of chewing on items in the home. Crate training, plus being comfortable and feeling safe when people had to leave, were also a must. (Ironically, Dorothy's foster worked from home and Dorothy's new owner also works from home, so it was a great transition in that way!)

Fast forward to June: Dorothy's forever family saw her on HAWS' Facebook page, and couldn't stop thinking of her. They reached out and wanted to do a meeting. Dorothy instantly clicked with the kids and the adults in the home, but needed several introductions to be comfortable enough to go home with her new dog sibling. Happily, now they're best friends!



Often, a dog like Dorothy can be pegged as one that wouldn't handle a busy household, but she is doing fabulously, according to her new mom, Ann: "It's like she's always been here! She's getting so comfortable. I'm sure we will have our challenges, but our early successes and her vibe since she hopped in my truck are encouraging. She is so eager to please and has already showed us she knows when she needs to go out, that she can "leave it," get down, understands come...she has also been a perfect lady with the cats! We have been very impressed with that...she is so sweet! Thank you for making her match with us a success! We are so happy to have her as part of our pack."

WE'RE IN THIS TOGETHER

HAWS involves many aspects, no matter how long they stay with us prior to adoption, or how involved they are with us once they've found their forever home. Happily, we've also found that the people who meet these pets along the way are impacted just as much. A cycle of teamwork has evolved to the point that there is no denying, as animals and humans, we are in this together!







Welcoming & Wellness

A recent, nationwide trend in animal welfare involves the length of time some pets spend in the shelter. Today we find pets in need of more interventions, both medical and behavioral. Thankfully, because of the strength of HAWS' veterinary team, plus our inclusive behavior programs, we are very well-equipped to help the animals in our care.

Already in this newsletter you have had the opportunity to read about Dorothy and Roscoe, dogs that benefitted from our Behavior department's employees and specially-trained volunteers. In-shelter programs like our Mod Squad and 2.0 Dog Walkers ensure dogs have enrichment and don't just languish in their kennels, while our Outings & Overnights fostering opportunities give much-needed, short term relief from the stress of shelter life.

But, medical interventions abound as well!

Earlier this year, HAWS welcomed 11-week-old puppy Daffodil. She quickly was diagnosed with severe pulmonic stenosis, meaning a valve connecting Daffodil's heart to her lungs did not open completely, keeping her heart from functioning properly. Without a special surgery, her estimated life span was less than one year. We began fundraising immediately to cover expenses of her care, and were overwhelmed with the outpouring of support and donations. Daffodil underwent heart surgery in late May and returned to foster care. She is set for a follow-up exam in August, and we look forward to the day we can announce Daffodil is ready for her forever home!

When any stray arrives at HAWS, our team is ready to spring into action. We're not just looking to reunite a lost pet with their owner; we also administer first aid, more advanced medical care, repair wounds and even set fractures. Sometimes the original owner is never found, but that doesn't mean we give up! Most often, the outcome is a smiley, happy and healthier pet, ready for a new beginning.

Chester Cheeto is one of the many FIV+ cats to find shelter, and a new adoptive home, through HAWS. The immuno-suppressive disease is no longer a death sentence for felines, and we are happy to educate prospective adopters – and the public in general – about FIV! It cannot be passed on to humans or dogs. Casual contact, even living with another cat, is fine as the disease is transmitted via a deep bite wound and not through sharing water bowls or snuggling. At times, one of our cat colony rooms will house compatible FIV+ cats, or even entire litters, to help dispel myths.

Amazing Alumni

We love the fact that our involvement with HAWS pets doesn't end once they are adopted.

In February we joined the celebration for Koda, a HAWS' alumni dog that saved his family from a devastating house fire. A staff favorite named Benny while at the shelter, the mixed breed alerted his humans to a fire that had spread from an outdoor grill to their walls and attic. HAWS was thankful to be able to offset some of Koda's medical expenses related to the smoke inhalation he suffered while doing his heroic work, with help from our Annie's Medical Fund. Noted his owner, Steve M.: "We had a fire one year from the date of us rescuing Koda. On that one-year anniversary, [he rescued us]."

HAWS' Education department has a roster of alumni pets that help with programs both in-schools and at our two locations. Kaa and Meatloaf live on site, always at the ready to teach about their unique species. Jeter (read his behavior success story on page 3), Gertie (turn to page 8 for her story), Louie, Bonita, Saph and Fiona are just a few of the dogs who are cheerfully ready to answer the call and clock time as Ambassa-dogs. Will work for belly rubs!

And, of course, each issue of this newsletter features alumni who are making lives better for their humans and others (see page 6)!

Compassionate Community


