HAWS' mission is to lead the community in animal welfare and assure sanctuary for animals in need. In the 1960s a group of community members saw a need - to lead, to ensure shelter for animals, give them care, and find them homes. Born out of this need and our founders' passion and commitment, HAWS was incorporated in 1965.



Much has changed since then, but the spirit of our founders and community remains the same. Over the years, HAWS has listened and responded to the needs of pets and their people, redefining and rethinking what animal sheltering can and should be.

As needs emerged over the years, HAWS added a training and behavior department to support both pets in the community and those in the shelter preparing for adoption. A spay and neuter clinic was opened, now performing over 7,500 procedures annually for pets awaiting their forever homes at the shelter and animals already living in forever homes. Several programs support the outdoor cats in our community. Education programs encourage youth to lean into their love of animals and practice the skills of compassion, empathy and responsibility. The incredible 77-acre HAWS Schallock Center for Animals is home to goats and horses, equine education programs, summer camps, school field trips, a private dog park and dog dock, animal enrichment and education opportunities.

It's been a busy 60 years! If you've ever witnessed a shutdown animal begin to wag its tail, seek comfort from you, or make biscuits on your lap while purring, you'll agree that every second has been, without a doubt, worth its weight in diamonds. There is immense value in the human-animal bond; sixty years ago, visionaries recognized this and started something amazing.

Since 1965, HAWS has seen five expansions to its now-bustling footprint, and every nook and cranny is dedicated to supporting our community. In these spaces you'll find the spirit of our founders in our staff and volunteers – as they stop to toss treats to a dog, prepare salad greens for small animals, socialize a cat, run a dog playgroup, witness the happiest goodbyes when a pet finds its forever home, and give endless support when the days are difficult. A tie binds us to each other across generations and history: a true love and compassion for animals.

I am proud to be part of an organization with such a rich history and dedicated founders, volunteers, staff and wide-ranging partners. Together, we've grown a humane community, and we'll continue to do so for years to come. True to our founder's spirit, we're committed to continuing to listen to needs in our community and supporting pets and their people. Cheers to an incredible 60 years!



Beyond Basic Training

In the summer of 2009, HAWS' Behavior department was created, tasked to go beyond simple training and classes for the public to also improving the lives of dogs both in our care and those adopted to our community. We knew getting the most out of our pets would happen through enhanced shelter enrichment practices.

What animals do and why they do it is important in understanding our relationships with each other. Our Behavior team continually seeks out general animal behavior knowledge as well as more in-depth information regarding dog behavior. That greater knowledge allows us to do all the right things to send home the best possible pet with our adopters.

Today our behavior staff and volunteers are tasked with learning more about each pet in our care and providing them with the mental and physical enrichment they need. They counsel prospective adopters on what to expect and how to prepare. Owners of pets (whether they are HAWS' alumni or not!) can take advantage of 1:1 consults to focus on particular concerns. We've curated a wide-range of training classes, as well as seminars and education opportunities for animal welfare professionals and the general community.

Sophia N., who leads our K9 Task Force, says it's not just about what we've done, but where we can grow: "We have accomplished working with reactive dogs, initiating playgroups and utilizing medical interventions to support behaviors. In the future, my hope is to help families who adopt from HAWS to apply the techniques the shelter dogs have been trained with to ensure their success in their new home."


All for Ebony

Ebony, an adult mixed breed, lived in HAWS' Behavior department office for several weeks in early 2025, after a surgical procedure similar to ACL surgery in humans. Staff and volunteers did hot and cold compresses on her surgical sight, as well as various physical therapy exercises and short walks. While rehabbing in the shelter environment wasn't ideal, Ebony was always her super-sweet self, enjoying belly rubs and cuddling. She was perfectly content as long as she had a bully stick and her big comfy bed. At her check-ups with veterinarian Dr. Dzika, he felt the staff did a great job with Ebony, and was confident in ruling out surgery on her other knee!

In mid-February Ebony headed to foster care with one of HAWS' training class instructors, Roxane, with the goals of continuing rehab and learning new things. Roxane quickly found that Ebony likes people and is a very content, laid back pup! Together they reinforced basic manners and building confidence in new environments.

HAWS' staff and volunteers have worked diligently to ensure Ebony can live a full life, where she can enjoy quiet times being the cuddly couch potato she is. Ebony will need to maintain a regular, low-impact exercise routine but is destined for a very normal life in her furever home!


HERMAN
