Animal welfare and education are key components to every aspect of our work at HAWS. We cannot support the pets of our community without the support of the people of our community. We cannot fulfill our mission without a strong, wide-ranging team of animal welfare advocates.

In this issue of the Tattle Tails we focus on the impact of education programs throughout the entire year.

Our education programs reach the youth of our community, giving them opportunities to practice compassion, respect and empathy through lessons and animal interactions. While summer camp welcomes the largest number of participants in the shortest time frame, programs throughout the rest of the year like the Hannah's Haven reading program, No More Bullying and Tuesday Troops kids' club continue to solidify the humane concepts learned during the warm-weather months.

The opening of our Schallock Center for Animals in 2021 broadened our spectrum, with equine programs and STEM field trips as highlights. HAWS is now able to present unique encounters to all ages – especially those who might not otherwise experience them – through Equine Explorers, our Adult Horse Program and more.

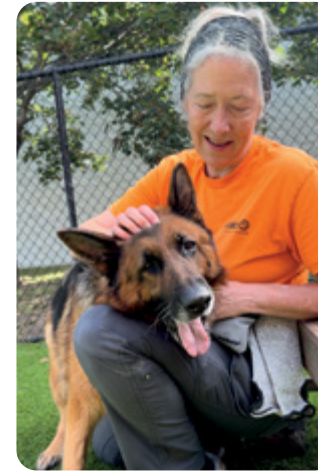
Our Behavior and Training team is in perpetual motion! The relationship between a pet and its person is also strengthened by learning together, so we continue to innovate with 1-day informational seminars alongside our basic-to-advanced training classes.

Volunteering at HAWS is also a tremendous way for our community to support us while helping us learn more about the animals in our care. Our volunteers give us valuable daily insight into our dogs, cats and small animals – their tendencies and what they need to be better adoption candidates.

The concept of “all ages” is of the utmost importance. Humane youth become humane adults. When we instill compassion and respect at a young age we will see the results far into the future. Our humane community continues to grow, and we are excited to learn alongside it! 🐾



Wanted: More Mod Squad!



Mod Squad volunteers work with HAWS' adoptable and not-quite-ready-to-adopt dogs. They are an additional set of eyes and ears for both our Behavior department and caretakers, ensuring the dogs at HAWS are receiving the support and enrichment they need.

We are currently looking for more dog lovers to join our Squad! Member Merry shares insight into what the Mod Squad does, and what it means to be a part of this unique volunteer group:

“Being part of the Mod Squad at HAWS has been a rewarding and fulfilling experience. I started as a dog walking volunteer, but soon realized I wanted to get more involved. The Mod Squad seemed the right opportunity to learn more about canine behavior and to provide support for those dogs that struggled with shelter life, were under-socialized, fearful or frustrated. It was an opportunity to address needs that would help the pups be more appealing candidates for adoption. And on a personal note, I wanted to be a better pet parent for my own dogs – to develop better handling skills, to understand their needs better and explore ideas to build a deeper bond with them.

“I enjoy the challenge of working with individual canine personalities (and quirks) and being creative to address the needs of that individual. The Mod Squad is a great opportunity to work with behavior professionals and volunteers that are passionate about helping dogs and are dedicated to continuous learning - not only shelter-sponsored learning, but reading, attending webinars and seminars, and learning from one another. As a team, we may approach behavior modification from slightly different angles or focus on different aspects, but it all adds up to successful outcomes for the pups.” 🐾

EDUCATION: For the Love of Animals

The Importance of Education

Education has always been at the forefront of our work. Our founders knew that a key component to helping animals was educating our community, not only about general care and needs of the animals around us, but also about the ways we can better coexist.

Early issues of this Tattle Tails newsletter featured helpful hints for avoiding lost pets – and the resulting successful reunions! Articles centered on veterinary care and the importance of spaying and neutering. Thinking ahead before adopting, and matching a pet to your lifestyle, were consistently discussed.

Initially, stray cat intake numbers averaged 200 each month. In 1973 alone, HAWS received a total of 1,013 strays: 434 dogs, 116 puppies, 192 cats, 265 kittens. Sadly, only about 20% were reunited with their owners. The summary statement that year: "Although we placed 862 pets in homes and returned 206 to their owners...4,127 had no place to go."

The only way to decrease the number of unwanted pets? Consistent messages of both the problems and the solutions – and not just to adults but to the youth in our community as well, planting the seeds of animal welfare and responsibility as soon as possible.

Education in Action

During the summer there is a certain, unmistakable energy at both our main shelter in Waukesha and the HAWS Schallock Center for Animals in Delafield. From Day Camp to Day Training, our facilities are in constant motion, packed with kids and adults, volunteers and staff, adopters, class participants and, most importantly, animal interactions. (The eerie quiet during the last week of August can come as a shock.)

Three months isn't nearly long enough to pass along all the wisdom we need to impart to our community. Learning must be continuous if we at HAWS wish to have a lasting impact; growing a humane community is a year-round endeavor.

So what is happening from September through May? Maybe the better question is, what ISN'T happening?!



Meet Bruce, fka Peter.

Sophia was fantastic and did a great job when Bruce met my dog Paco (also a HAWS dog). The staff were so happy to see Peter go to his forever home, and one lady was practically in tears in the parking lot when she saw Bruce going home and said goodbye. I think that is a tremendous testament to the kind of staff and volunteers you have at HAWS. I could tell how much they really care about the animals, which is so refreshing. Kudos to you! So, a special thank you to everyone at HAWS for taking such good care of this boy.

The Learning Continues

Once the school-year begins, HAWS' education efforts cover ground both inside and outside of our shelter walls. In-school programs like Hannah's Haven and No More Bullying go hand-in-paw with our in-shelter kids' volunteer clubs and opportunities when there is a day off from school. Yes, it's a big deal that we welcome about 1,200 kids to summer camp each year. But, we also bring our message (and ambassador pets!) to thousands of school students, reaching them on their home turf. And, with the opening of our Schallock Center for Animals in 2021, we've been able to add school field trips as well as equine education.

We've found that kids who participate in our programs become adults who participate in our programs. We've also found that kids are great recruiters, getting their parents to join our volunteer corps and enroll to train at HAWS with the family dog. Our Behavior department has developed classes with continuation in mind: Start with Life Skills for Puppies, graduate to Basic Manners, grow into Agility.

With community outreach – including appearances at events, presentations, Mobile stops, Pause with HAWS corporate visits, education programs and more – HAWS visits over 200 places a year to educate, talk, learn and share information about animal welfare, compassion, our responsibilities and the ways we can all coexist.

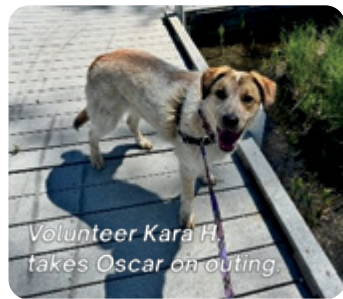
Positive Results

The numbers don't lie; we've seen dramatic changes over the years in the most important areas. In 2017, HAWS achieved no-kill status while maintaining open admissions – and we're not going back!

We are only able to do this because of community involvement and advocacy for HAWS and our mission.

Our volunteers are dedicated to our animals, doing activities like dog outings (see page 10) to give us more insight into our resident canines; successful, permanent adoptions are the direct result (see Bruce/Peter's story at left). They continue to educate both themselves and us for the betterment of our residents.

Best of all, our youth are putting the lessons they have learned through HAWS into action – holding drives at school, doing Scout projects for our benefit (check out Knox at left), collecting "presents" for HAWS' pets instead of themselves for their birthdays! Kids are looking to learn more, and we're invested in them – for both their future and ours. It's exciting to look ahead! 🐾

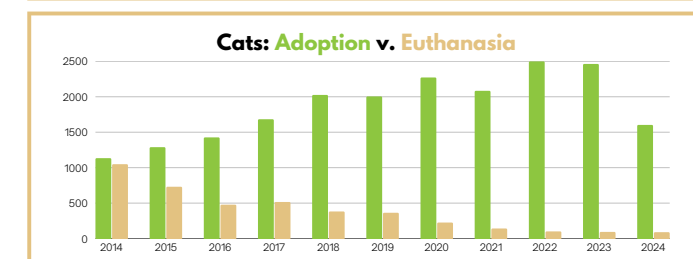
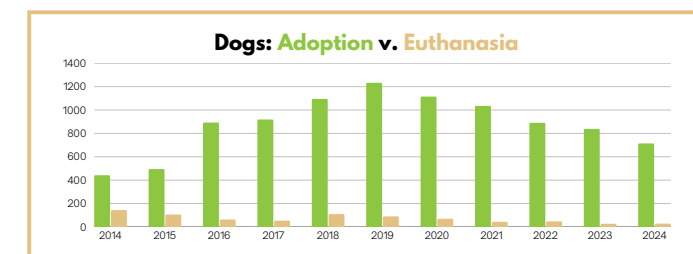

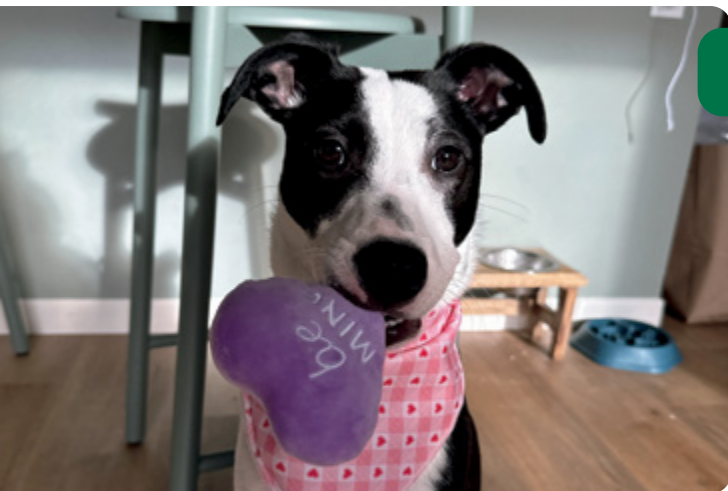


LOUIE

Hannah’s Haven: New & Improved

The Hannah’s Haven reading program, created in loving memory of alumni dog Hannah, became a school outreach program for 1st through 5th grades in the 2021-2022 school year. This unique initiative by HAWS is designed to help low readers improve their literacy skills over the course of a semester: Children read aloud to HAWS’ alumni dogs, helping enhance their reading confidence, fluency and comprehension.

Now, for the 2025-2026 school year, up to 10 students will engage in weekly 20-minute reading sessions, guided by trained HAWS staff. Various reading materials are suited to each child’s reading level: The students start with reading material identified by their teacher to be at their current level, then material progressively increases in difficulty with the goal of challenging them as their confidence grows!

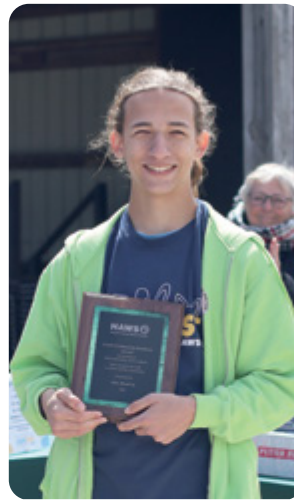
The comforting presence of a dog helps to keep them relaxed and engaged. Additionally, the bond formed with the dog can create a positive association with reading, making it a more enjoyable experience. The combination of regular practice, increased confidence, and emotional support ultimately leads to noticeable improvement in the child’s reading abilities by the end of the semester.

Both teachers and our staff members have noticed tremendous changes for the participants, noting things like “Joe likes to read to the dogs. He feels comfortable, and it is the only place he enjoys reading out loud. He believes that eventually the dogs will begin to know words, too! He never forgot to try to keep Louie the dog interested.”

Dog Walker Outings

Dog Walker Outings provide further enrichment for our dogs by taking the opportunity to get outdoors one step further. A Dog Walker Outing is a quick trip out of the shelter environment where the dog can enjoy some one-on-one time with volunteers. These outings often include trips to Culver's for an ice cream treat, to Starbucks for a pup cup, or to our Schallock Center for Animals to use the private dog park! By going on an adventure with one of our dogs, volunteers are giving them a nurturing experience that helps in their transition to find a forever home. The prerequisite to participate is to take Dog Walking Orientation.

Kennel Advocacy Orientation

The Kennel Advocate Program is designed to support the adoption process at the shelter by assisting potential adopters during viewing hours. Kennel Advocates guide adopters to resources such as adoption applications and information about specific animals, while facilitating one-on-one sessions with animals. They also engage with the animals during quieter times, building relationships and understanding each animal's personality to help match them with the right adopters.

We have now added two additional orientations per month (3 total) after training our latest KA Facilitators, which means we will have a higher capacity to onboard new volunteers! This program operates during viewing hours, so volunteers are needed from 1-5pm weekdays, and 11am-3pm on weekends. *At right, several KAs tell their stories!*

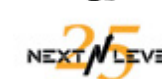
